## SUMMER 2022 EDITION OF THE PANEL PERIODICAL

Summer 2022 finds the U.S. District Court – in the Denver, Grand Junction, Durango, and Colorado Springs courthouses – in full swing of civil, criminal, and other "cases and controversies." New judges have been sworn in (<u>U.S. Magistrate Judge Maritza Dominguez Braswell</u> on July 6), will soon be sworn in (<u>U.S. District Judge Charlotte N. Sweeney, U.S. Magistrate Judge Nina Y. Wang</u>), or have taken senior status (<u>Judge Arguello</u>). In July, Naturalization ceremonies will return to the Arraj Courthouse (July 21), jury trials concluded or conducted in notable cases (20-cr-00152-PAB, <u>USA v. Penn, et al [unlawful restraint of trade]</u>; 22-CR-012-WJM, <u>USA v. Rudolph et al [foreign murder, insurance fraud]</u>), and even the <u>makeshift federal courtroom</u> near Hayden, Colo. for processing of violations regarding the Rainbow Family Gathering. In other words, the Arraj, Rogers, Wayne Aspinall (Grand Junction), La Plata County (Durango) and Wahsatch Ave. (Colo. Springs) courthouses and even Routt National Forest have witnessed the forward progress of federal dockets.

This issue of the Panel Periodical features some important administrative matters for Civil Pro Bono Panel attorneys – the 2022 Biennial / Renewal Fee, a new Certificate of Good Standing issuance process, and a reminder about the shared Civil Pro Bono Panel PACER login and password, and a re-print of the Panel appointment process. Also discussed are some important and valuable training seminars hosted by the Faculty of Federal Advocates, the development of a Civil Pro Bono Panel Resource Library at the Arraj Courthouse, and a "request for submission" of articles on important caselaw developments, such as the Supreme Court's recent *Egbert v. # **Important Attorney Administrative Matters**

#### Biennial / Renewal Fee:

Please note that **BEGINNING Oct. 1, 2022** and ending **Dec. 31, 2022**, the U.S. District Court will be collecting the biennial (every two years) renewal fee. In 2022 the mandatory fee is \$60.00, collected from all bar members who wish to renew their bar status and remain in good standing. Please be aware that all funds collected through the biennial fee program are directed to the U.S. District Court's Federal Pro Se Clinic and the Federal Pro Se Bankruptcy Clinic, both of which are operated by the Colorado Bar Association. Instructions on the payment procedure are forthcoming, but the page acts as the information clearinghouse about the fee and the process for payment. The page includes Chief Judge Brimmer's June 1, 2022 General Order 2022-7: Establishment of a Biennial Fee to Assist the Funding of the Federal Pro Se Clinic Program, which includes the order that:

"[T]he Court hereby establishes, on an ongoing basis, the means of funding the operations of the Federal Pro Se Clinic and the Federal Bankruptcy Pro Se Clinic by collecting a biennial renewal fee, collected every two years, from all U.S. District Court bar members. The fee amount will vary, depending on the reasonable needs of the Federal Pro Se Clinic program. The fee is waived for all attorneys employed by the U.S. government who serve in a legal capacity."

**NOTE** – please <u>do not</u> attempt to pay the Biennial / Renewal Fee at this time – the payment process has not gone "live" in the court's CM/ECF database, which is how the fee will be paid (the Attorney Services Portal, the previous means to pay the Biennial Renewal Fee, has been replaced by the "Single Sign-On" NextGen CM/ECF system).

#### Requests for Certificates of Good Standing:

Since many federal district courts, bankruptcy courts, and courts of appeal have transitioned to the NextGen CM/ECF system for attorney admissions, and since many of those courts require a Certificate of Good Standing from other federal district courts [note that the District of Colorado does not require it], the clerk's office has seen an uptick in the number of certificate requests from this court. Rather than rely on submission of a credit card payment form and a manual processing scheme, the clerk's office has adopted a more efficient process.

Effective July 1, 2022, attorney requests for both Certificates of Good Standing must be submitted through the U.S. District Court's Case Management/Electronic Case Filing system. Please note that the use of an e-mailed credit card authorization form to the Clerk's Office no longer serves as the method to request a certificate and is NOT available after July 1. #### Shared Pro Bono Panel PACER Login and Password:

Please remember that the PACER Login and Password which we encourage Panel members to use (the login and password themselves are provided in the Monthly Available Case e-mails) should only be used for *viewing* pro bono case documents, not for <u>filing</u>. You do need to use your own CM/ECF credentials when filing documents in a case. A miscommunication about the use of the login for participation in another pro bono program led to some confusion – if you have any questions, please contact Ed or Ashley.

# Request for Article Submission – U.S. Supreme Court decision Egbert v. Boule, No. 21-147

On June 8, 2022, the U.S. Supreme Court held that the authority of a court to imply a cause of action under *Bivens v. Six Unknown Named Agents of Federal Bureau of Narcotics* does not extend to either respondent Robert Boule's Fourth Amendment excessive-force claim or his First Amendment retaliation claim.. In her dissent, Justice Sotomayor wrote, "Today's decision does not overrule *Bivens*. It nevertheless contravenes precedent and will strip many more individuals who suffer injuries at the hands of other federal officers, and whose circumstances are materially indistinguishable from those in *Bivens*, of an important remedy."

Since *Bivens* cases are frequently heard in this court and is the cause of action in many Civil Pro Bono Panel cases, any Panel lawyers who would like to offer their analysis and insight on the potential ramifications of *Egbert* are invited to share their opinion (with full recognition that the statements and opinions expressed would be those of the author(s), and not of the U.S. District Court's or its Standing Committee on pro se litigation).

Also, the Standing Committee on Pro Se Litigation welcomes any thoughts or suggestions for article submissions about pro bono case experiences or caselaw developments that impact typical cases on the pro bono docket. ## U.S. District Court Civil Pro Bono Panel Program Procedure

- Ashley Sheehan, Paralegal, U.S. District Court -

An attorney has five business days to review the case, conduct a conflicts check, and otherwise determine if the attorney is able to accept the appointment. Regardless of whether an attorney can accept the case or not, the attorney must contact us to let us know. If the attorney intends to proceed with the case and undertake representation, the Attorney Services Division will then enter a Notice of Appointment notifying the court and opposing counsel that you have been selected, and from that point a 30-day time period will commence. The Attorney Services Division also sends a Letter of Introduction to the Pro Se Litigant to help start the relationship between the attorney and the litigant (see below). The 30-day period allows the attorney to interview the client, arrange an engagement letter, etc., and otherwise reach a final determination whether or not representation of the pro se party will go forward. Within that 30-day period, the selected attorney(s) will need to enter a formal appearance in the case; or, if it appears representation is not possible because of extraordinary circumstances, a Notice Declining Appointment will need to be filed by the attorney(s).

The process repeats if the attorney declines appointment. If no attorney is able to take on the case, the Attorney Services Divisions reports the status to chambers after the fifth attorney declines the case. The case will continue to be distributed to the entire Pro Bono Panel through the monthly e-mail, and is also posted on the court's <a href="Civil Pro Bono Panel">Civil Pro Bono Panel</a> page, available to any attorney.

This letter is to inform you that pursuant to U.S. Magistrate Judge Nina Y. Wang's May 13, 2020 Order of Appointment of counsel, the clerk's office of the U.S. District Court placed your case on the list of civil actions from which counsel will be appointed from the court's Civil Pro Bono Panel of attorneys. I am pleased to report that attorneys Kathryn Starnella and Chelsie Smith of the law firm of Wells, Anderson & Race, LLC have been selected as counsel in this matter. Ms. Starnella and Ms. Smith have reviewed the documents in your case and have preliminarily agreed to represent you. They would like to contact you to further discuss your case. As directed by the Civil Pro Bono Panel local rule, their discussion with you is to explore if any actual or potential conflicts of interest exist, whether the dispute could be resolved more appropriately by other means, and in general whether representation of you in this matter should proceed. Please understand that at this point they have not accepted your case formally.

Ms. Starnella and Ms. Smith have substantial legal backgrounds with a variety of experiences in many areas of law, including government entity and law enforcement defense litigation, and they and their law firm are members of this court's federal trial bar.

This letter is a means of officially introducing the law firm of Wells, Anderson & Race, LLC to you and to inform you that they have responded to the Court's request for pro bono representation. Ms. Starmella and Ms. Smith will be contacting you shortly to introduce themselves to you, and to converse with you about your case. However, please be aware that they are acting purely on a voluntary basis and will litigate this matter in consultation with you, using their experience and talent in all aspects of the case, including strategic decision making. They can withdraw from the case if they determine that they can no longer represent you under the Rules of Professional Conduct for attorneys.

I hope your discussions go well. I am enclosing a copy of the judge's original Order of Appointment, the Clerk's Notice of Appointment, and a copy of the court's Civil Pro Bono Local Rule.

Besides full representation of parties in these Pro Bono Panel cases we always have a need for limited representation, and one option to consider with representing any of the parties in the list of cases is to assist the party with a discrete task through limited representation (unbundling) which the U.S. District Court now permits. Here is the link to the "Limited Representation" page on the court's website that provides access to the Limited Representation Instruction Handbook, explains the court's rules, provides sample motions, sample engagement agreements, and a checklist for the limited representation procedure.

## JUDICIAL OFFICER NEWS

• Welcome New U.S. Magistrate Judge – Maritza Dominguez Braswell

United States Magistrate Judge Maritza Dominguez Braswell was sworn into office on the afternoon of July 6, 2022 by Chief Judge Philip A. Brimmer. Magistrate Judge Dominguez Braswell (note: no hyphen) received her undergraduate degree from the University of Denver in 2002, and her law degree from Rutgers Law School in 2008. She was in private practice until joining the Colorado Attorney General's Office in 2019 as Deputy Attorney General of the Employment and Civil Litigation section. In that position, she also was

appointed by Chief Judge Brimmer to the Standing Committee on Pro Se Litigation, the oversight committee of the Civil Pro Bono Panel, serving as a non-voting member.

A formal investiture ceremony will be planned for a later date. Magistrate Judge Dominguez Braswell's chambers are located in Colorado Springs. Her chamber's telephone number is: 719-575-0328. Cases assigned to Magistrate Judge Dominguez Braswell will be identified on the docket by her initials MDB, and her judicial officer page on the court's website is available <a href="here">here</a>, which includes her <a href="Practice Standards">Practice Standards</a>.

## • Welcome Charlotte N. Sweeney as U.S. District Judge

Though she has yet to be sworn in as a U.S. District Judge at the time of this newsletter, Charlotte Sweeney has been confirmed by the U.S. Senate to fill the position previously held by Judge R. Brooke Jackson, who how has taken senior status. Among many other volunteer positions, Ms. Sweeney also served on the board of the Faculty of Federal Advocates, was the President of the FFA in 2015, and also represented clients on a probono basis as part of the Civil Pro Bono Panel and Counsel / Co-counsel programs in at least three separate cases, and served as a mentor advisor in several others. Her first day on the bench is expected to be Aug. 1.

Once Charlotte Sweeney is given the oath of office as a district judge, the court will send an e-mail informing all bar members about her courtroom location and contact information.

## • U.S. District Judge Christine M. Arguello / U.S. Magistrate Judge Nina Y. Wang

On July 15, 2022 <u>Judge Arguello</u> took senior status, with her position to be filled by U.S. Magistrate Judge Nina Y. Wang, who was <u>nominated</u> by President Biden on Jan. 19, 2022. 
### COMING SOON - THE CIVIL PRO BONO PANEL RESOURCE LIBRARY -





# Interested in Serving as a Guardian Ad Litem? – Opportunities Frequently Arise

Please be aware that the court is in need periodically for attorneys to serve as guardians ad litem for minors, or incapacitated adults. The court has authority to appoint a G.A.L. under <u>Fed. R. Civ. P. 17(c)</u>, and directs the clerk of the court to select and invite lawyers to serve.





Guardians ad litem ideally perform their duties on a pro bono basis, but please be aware that limited funding is available from the court's Non-Appropriated Fund ("Plan For The Administration Of Locally Held Attorney Admission Funds") (i.e., funds derived from bar admission fees). The G.A.L. appointed in the case referenced above was granted her fees in part from the Non-Appropriated Fund.

### POWER Act Event — Denver Indian Center and Webinar

# -September 7, 2022 -

All Civil Pro Bono Panel members are invited to attend (for CLE credits, including an ethics portion) the 2022 POWER Act event. The POWER Act is the acronym for "Pro Bono Work to Empower and Represent Act of 2018" (P. L. 115-237) that Congress passed on September 4, 2018. The primary goal of the POWER Act is for the U.S. district courts to partner with local, tribal, or territorial domestic abuse service providers and local volunteer lawyer projects to promote pro bono legal services as a way to empower survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault, and stalking, and to engage citizens in assisting those survivors.

For 2022, the U.S. District Court, Faculty of Federal Advocates, and the Colorado / Denver Bar Associations are hosting an in-person AND webinar event at the Denver Indian Center, 4407 Morrison Rd., Denver. The program will be conducted as a "hybrid" affair – Rick Waters of the Denver Indian Center, Toni-Anne Nunez of Metro Volunteer Lawyers, and James Wilder of the Office of Attorney Regulation Counsel will speak in person at the Denver Indian Center on behalf of their organizations. The other speakers – all of whom spoke at our Sept. 2020 event held in Southwest Colorado— will appear by Zoom.
