If you handle your case without the help of a lawyer, you must still follow the rules and instructions put in place by the judge. If you get some help - but not <u>complete</u> help - from a lawyer with part of your case, you must <u>still</u> follow the judge's rules and instructions for everything else <u>not</u> handled by the lawyer.

If you are <u>not</u> in prison, reach out to the Federal Pro Se Clinic <u>before</u> contacting the Federal Limited Appearance Program or asking the court for a lawyer from the Civil Pro Bono Panel.

^{*}The Pro Se Prisoner Task Force is a pilot program that operates under the Federal Pro Se Clinic (FPSC) and provides limited legal assistance in cases filed by pro se prisoners incarcerated at the Colorado Department of Corrections Fremont Correctional Facility. Such cases must have passed the Court's initial screening process.

^{**}FLAP lawyers can only appear in court to help with these types of hearings: status conference, scheduling hearing, discovery dispute, pre-trial conference, settlement hearing.
